

**RESOLUTION
TO HONOR THE LIFE OF DOLORES HUERTA ON APRIL 10**

**SANTA CLARA COUNTY BOARD OF EDUCATION
RESOLUTION No. 2278-2**

WHEREAS, the Santa Clara County Office of Education, as the Region 1 lead provides services to students in the Migrant Education program in Santa Clara, San Benito, San Mateo, Alameda, San Francisco, and Santa Cruz counties. The general purpose of the Migrant Education Program is to ensure that migrant children fully benefit from the same free public education and support services provided to other children; and,

WHEREAS, the Santa Clara County Office of Education provides direct services to approximately 700 school-age migrant students within the region; and,

WHEREAS, the Santa Clara County Office of Education is an organization that operates under four main principles, equity, inclusion, diversity, and partnership. Under these principles, it is important to acknowledge the life and work of civil rights leaders whose work directly impacts our student populations; and,

WHEREAS, Dolores Huerta is an American Labor leader and civil rights activist, and is co-founder with Cesar Chavez of the National Farmworkers Association which later became the United Farm Workers, whose work safeguarded the rights of farm workers addressing worker protection, pesticide use, and immigration reform; and,

WHEREAS, on July 18, 2018, Governor Jerry Brown signed Assembly Bill 2644, introduced by Assembly member Eloise Reyes (AD-47); designating April 10th as Dolores Huerta Day, making civil rights leader and community organizer, Dolores Huerta, the first and only living person to hold this honor; and,

WHEREAS, Assembly Bill 2644 adds Section 37222.20 to the Education Code, stating “On Dolores Huerta Day, all public schools and educational institutions are encouraged to conduct exercises remembering the life of Dolores Huerta, recognizing her accomplishments, and familiarizing pupils with the contributions she made to this state”; and,

WHEREAS, Dolores Clara Fernandez Huerta was born on April 10, 1930, in Dawson, New Mexico, the daughter of Juan and Alicia Fernandez. This year is the 90th celebration of her birthday; and,

WHEREAS, Dolores Huerta became a school teacher in Stockton, California and became conscious of the need for economic justice through seeing her students come to school barefoot and hungry; and,

WHEREAS, during the 1950s, Huerta met legendary community organizer Fred Ross, Sr. and found her calling as an organizer serving in the leadership of the Stockton Community Service Organization (CSO), during which time she set up voter registration drives, pressed local governments for barrio improvements and founded the Agricultural Workers Association (AWA); and,

WHEREAS, Dolores Huerta’s famed lobbying efforts were crucial in securing Aide for Families with Dependent Children (AFDC) and disability insurance for farm workers in the State of California in 1963; and,

WHEREAS, Dolores Huerta is the most prominent Mexican-American female labor leader in the United States. For over 60 years beginning in the 1960s, Huerta lobbied in Sacramento and Washington D.C., organized field strikes, directed UFW boycotts, led farm worker campaigns for political candidates, negotiated the first UFW labor contracts and has played a major role in the American civil rights movement; and,

WHEREAS, in 2002 Dolores Huerta founded the Dolores Huerta Foundation, which recruits and empowers grassroots leaders in low-income communities to attain social justice by organizing volunteer organizations called Vecinos Unidos (United Neighborhoods) to work on issues in education, health, the environment, civic engagement and economic development; and,

WHEREAS, Dolores Huerta has received numerous awards, among them the California State Senate’s Outstanding Labor Leader Award, the ACLU Roger Baldwin Medal of Liberty Award, the Eugene V. Debs Foundation Outstanding American Award, the Ellis Island Medal of Freedom Award, the Consumer’s Union Trumpeter’s Award, Ms. Magazine’s “Woman of the Year” for 1998, the Eleanor Roosevelt Human Rights Award from President Clinton in 1998; and,

WHEREAS, Dolores currently has five California schools named after her. The Dolores Huerta Middle School in Santa Clara Unified will be opening in August of 2021 making it the sixth California school named in her honor; and,

WHEREAS, Dolores Huerta was inducted into the National Women’s Hall of Fame in 1993, and served on the Board of Regents of the University of California; and,

WHEREAS, in 2012, President Obama presented Huerta the Medal of Freedom, the highest civilian award in the United States; and,

WHEREAS, her rallying cry of “Sí Se Puede” continues to call us to fight for the changes our communities need to thrive; and,

WHEREAS, members of society will benefit from having the opportunity to learn more about this leader for social justice and civil rights, empowering them to fight for fair representation, voting rights, and equitable education; and,

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED that the Santa Clara County Board of Education and County Superintendent of Schools does hereby adopt this resolution to honor a national civil rights and labor leader in America on or around April 10 Dolores Huerta Day.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED all members of Santa Clara County Office of Education are encouraged to teach about the life and struggles of Dolores Huerta and to conduct celebrations honoring the life of Dolores Huerta as a powerful force for social justice and empowerment for all.




