- Project Goals
  - to promote the vocabulary acquisition and language development of students in the SCCOE Deaf and Hard of Hearing Program
  - to provide parents, families, and interested community members with an online resource for learning and using signed English with their children



## Why is this important?

- Historically, most Deaf and Hard of Hearing children struggle academically, partly because they often have delayed language development, which may result in academic challenges.
- Being Deaf or Hard of Hearing does not cause language delay; it is language deprivation, caused by inability to access language, that causes language delay.

#### **SCCOE DHOH Program**

- Serves students from Santa Clara County who are eligible for special education under the categories of deaf or hard of hearing
- Serves students from birth through age 22
- School aged program (ages 3 -22) has classes on four sites within Santa Clara County

### **COE Program at Oster Elementary**

- Serves DHOH students from preschool through fifth grade
- Serves DHOH students in special day or general education classes
- Uses Total Communication and Signed English to promote language development

#### **Total Communication**

 Total Communication (TC) supports the use of all modes of communication and language as needed in differing contexts. This includes ASL and more English-based systems of signing (i.e., Signing Exact English, Sign-Supported Speech, and Conceptually Accurate Signed English), spoken English, mime, facial expression, and gestures.

# Signing Exact English (S.E.E.)

 Signing Exact English is a sign language system that represents literal English. To make visible everything that is not heard, S.E.E. supplements what a child can get from hearing and speechreading. Since American Sign Language (ASL) has different vocabulary, idioms and syntax from English, SEE modifies and supplements the vocabulary of ASL so children can see clearly what is said in English.

## **Learning S.E.E.**


- There are many physical and online resources to learn ASL. The resources available to learn S.E.E. are more limited:

  - Purchase of an online curriculum with videos
  - One app for iPhones or iPads
  - Weekly classes at Oster during the regular school year

- Continuous ability to update the content


