



Sixth grade core classes have approximately 25 students. Seventh and eighth grade core classes are staffed at between 24 and 28 students. Math and English classes have reduced class sizes of 24.

We expect to be looking particularly for teachers of math, science, special education, secondary reading, and elementary grades but actual openings are not known at this time.

COURSE OF STUDY

The K-5 grade curriculum consists of math, language arts, social studies, science, art, music and P.E. Small groups provide frequent teacher-student contact with emphasis on individualized attention. Each K-5 school utilizes Enrichment Centers as part of the program.

GRADES 6TH - 8TH

Redwood Middle School focuses on basic skills and provides a variety of learning experiences for students. There are two semesters per year; students are programmed in seven classes a semester.
