Public Health Updates

Santa Clara County Downgrades to Red Tier

Santa Clara County is at the Red Risk Level under the State's new COVID-19 reopening framework. That means certain activities can resume, and certain businesses can reopen indoor operations at reduced capacity. Some indoor businesses and activities are still too high risk to allow at this time, however, and the local order and directives ensure that people who live in the county are protected from these risks. For example, movie theaters, indoor gatherings, and indoor dining are not yet permitted to reopen under Santa Clara County's Order. Remember to follow the more restrictive set of rules. Continue to keep your distance, wear your mask, and get tested.

Santa Clara County is at **Red Risk Level**

Allowed indoors:

- > Nail salons
- > Body waxing salons
- > Tattoo and piercing parlors
- > K-12 Schools (after being 14 days in Red)
- > Museums, zoos and aquariums at 25% capacity
- > Gyms and fitness centers at 10% capacity
- > Malls can increase capacity to 50% (opened at 25% in Purple)

Not currently allowed to resume operation under the County Order:

- > Movie theaters
- > Indoor dining
- > Indoor gatherings

Counties can move to a less restrictive level as COVID transmission goes down and testing goes up. Stay diligent about keeping your distance, wearing your mask, getting tested, and following all protocols and directives.

Gov. Newsom Unveils Statewide Blueprint for a Safer Economy

[The Statewide Blueprint](#) builds on lessons learned from the first six months of the disease – and the new scientific understanding that has been collected – to

create a new system for regulating movement and COVID-19 transmissions. It includes:

- At least 21 days to expand activities beyond the initial tier to ensure California better limits the spread of the virus;
- Mandatory metrics – case rates and test positivity – to measure how widespread COVID-19 is in each county and guide what is allowed;
- A uniform state framework, with four categories instead of 58 different sets of rules;
- A more nuanced way of allowing activity: Instead of open vs. closed, sectors can be partially opened and progressively add to their operations as disease transmission decreases; and
- A new process for tightening back up again quickly when conditions worsen. Based on how prevalent COVID-19 is in each county and the extent of community spread. That color will indicate how sectors can operate.

Based on the extent of the community spread of COVID-19 in each county, a corresponding color indicates how sectors can operate.

WIDESPREAD	Many non-essential indoor business operations are closed
SUBSTANTIAL	Some non-essential indoor business operations are closed
MODERATE	Some indoor business operations are open with modifications
MINIMAL	Most indoor business operations are open with modifications



Centers for Disease Control and Prevention Guidance

Emerging evidence suggests a significant number of people may be infected with COVID-19 who are asymptomatic and capable of spreading the virus to others. People are now considered to be infectious 48 hours before the start of their symptoms until their isolation period ends. This makes social distancing and frequent hand washing even more critical.

Free COVID-19 Testing Sites



With more than 50 sites open across Santa Clara County, the Public Health Department continues to help more people get tested for COVID-19. Those without health insurance or those who do not provide insurance information can still get a test at those sites. For people without COVID-19 symptoms, the County currently offers indoor and drive-thru sites. People with symptoms are directed to drive-thru sites to reduce the chance of getting others sick.

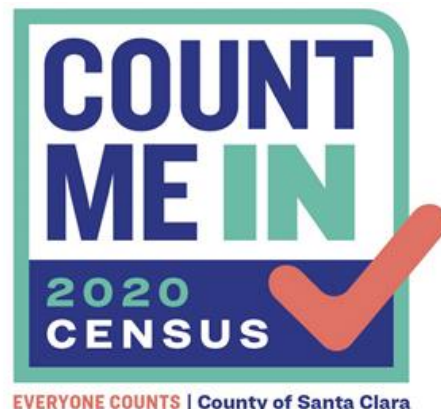
AlertSCC

Be Heard By November 3, 2020!

Due to the pandemic, you may have concerns regarding the November 3rd election. Registering to vote and casting your vote may appear a bit overwhelming. However, during this upcoming election it is actually easier to do both. If you have not yet registered to vote or would like to verify the status of your registration, please visit the [California Voter Registration](#). Please note the **deadline to register to vote is Oct 19, 2020**, 15 days before **Election Day on Nov 3, 2020**. Anyone who is registered to vote will receive a ballot mailed to them automatically. Completed ballots can be returned in the free postage-paid envelope that is provided or can be placed in one of 98 conveniently located drop-boxes throughout the county.

[The Registrar of Voters Office](#) will also be open for early voting beginning on October 5, 2020 through Election Day. Voters who prefer to vote in person can still do so at any of the more than 100 Vote Centers that will be open throughout Santa Clara County starting October 31, 2020.

Adhering to COVID-19 protocols, the Vote Centers will offer sanitary, in-person options for a full spectrum of services including language and accessibility assistance. For more information visit sccvote.org/voterschoice or call **866-430-VOTE (8683)**. A few dates to keep in mind:

OUT for Safe Schools™ Campaign

Created to encourage school staff to publicly identify as supportive LGBTQ allies on campus, the [OUT for Safe Schools™ Campaign](#) lets students know that “safe spaces” are throughout the entire school campus, and that processes are in place for distance learning.

In its endeavor to create a culture of inclusion while countering bullying, harassment, social isolation, and bigotry that dramatically increase risk factors for LGBTQ persons, the SCCOE is offering to support school districts in meeting the needs of LGBTQ youth.

Law and Policy

Who is eligible for GPD?

Participant Eligibility Requirements (coordinated by Sourcewise):

- Must be 65 or older or high-risk. High-risk includes those who are COVID-19 positive, COVID-19 exposed as documented by a public health official or medical professional or individuals with an underlying condition
 - Must live alone or with one (1) program-eligible adult; must not be currently receiving assistance from other federal nutrition assistance programs
 - Receive no more than \$74,940 in income for a household of one (1) and \$101,460 for a household of two (2), this equates to 600% of the federal poverty limit
 - Must affirm an inability to prepare or obtain meals
