**Message from the County Superintendent of Schools,
Dr. Mary Ann Dewan**

Hello everyone,

September is National Suicide Prevention Awareness Month. Youth suicide is a preventable public health problem, yet it occurs at high levels in California and nationwide. More important than ever, parents, teachers, healthcare providers, and youth must learn and understand the key elements of youth suicide prevention. The COVID-19 pandemic exacerbated the teen mental health crisis. According to the [CDC](#), the number of people having thoughts of suicide and experiencing depression has nearly doubled as compared to the years before the pandemic.

The National Alliance on Mental Illness (NAMI) has several valuable resources for us to reference, including (1) [Know the Warning Signs and Risk Factors of Suicide](#), (2) [Being Prepared for a Crisis](#), and (3) [Navigating a Mental Health Crisis](#). In the meantime, through honest conversation and assisting youth who need it, we can help prevent suicides and save lives. Suicidal thoughts can affect anyone regardless of age, gender, or background. Pain and trauma aren't always obvious, but many people who have thoughts of suicide show some signs. The signs may appear in conversations, through their actions, or in social media posts. Individuals may make statements about feeling hopeless, helpless, or worthless, showing a deepening depression, taking unnecessary risks, or exhibiting self-destructive behavior. Other signs may include:

- changes in eating or sleeping habits
- frequent or pervasive sadness
- withdrawal from friends, family, and regular activities

- frequent complaints about physical symptoms often related to emotions, such as stomachaches, headaches, fatigue, etc.
- a decline in the quality of schoolwork
- preoccupation with death and dying

If you observe one or more of these warning signs, especially if the behavior is new, or has increased, consider telling the child or person how important they are to you. Validate their feelings and express empathy. And, don't be afraid to talk openly about your concern. These four steps may help with your support:


1. Have a planned conversation: Before starting a conversation with someone you are concerned about, be prepared. Have a list of crisis resources on hand. Practice what you will say. Plan the conversation when you won't be in a hurry and can spend time with the person.
2. Listen to understand, express concern, and reassure: Listen to the person's reasons for both living and dying. Validate that they are considering both options and underscore that living is an option for them. Steer aware of closed, yes/no questions, especially ones that may indicate you want "No" for an answer. Open-ended questions may provide a greater understanding of the situation.
3. Create a safety plan: Ask the person if they have access to any lethal means (weapons, medications, etc.) and help remove them from the vicinity. (Another friend, family member, or law enforcement agent may be needed to assist with this.)
4. Get Help: If you feel the situation is critical, take the person to a nearby Emergency Room or walk-in psychiatric crisis clinic, or call 9-1-1. Do not put yourself in danger; if you are concerned about your safety, contact 911.

In addition, the Santa Clara County Suicide & Crisis Hotline (SACS) has a 24-hour, toll-free, confidential suicide prevention hotline. Highly-trained volunteer Crisis Phone Counselors are available seven (7) days a week for phone intervention and emotional support. In addition, SACS provides a cost-free, drop-in Survivors of Suicide Support Group (SOS) where adults who have lost a loved one to suicide can meet weekly to process some of the thoughts and feelings they experienced resulting from their loss.




