### **Epstein's Framework** for Parent Involvement

TYPE 1: PARENTING: Assist families with understanding child and adolescent development and setting home conditions that support children as students at each age and grade level. Assist schools in understanding families.

TYPE 2: COMMUNICATING: Communicate with families about school programs and student progress through effective school-to-home and home-to-school communications.



### **Epstein's Framework** for Parent Involvement

TYPE 3: VOLUNTEERING: Improve recruitment, training, and schedules to involve families as volunteers and audiences at the school or in other locations to support students and school programs.

TYPE 4: LEARNING AT HOME: Involve families with their children in learning activities at home, including homework and other curriculum-linked activities and decisions.



### **Epstein's Framework** for Parent Involvement

TYPE 5: DECISION-MAKING: Include families as participants in school decisions, governance, and advocacy through PTA/PTO, school councils, committees, action teams, and other parent organizations.

#### **TYPE 6: COLLABORATING WITH THE**

**COMMUNITY:** Coordinate community resources and services for, students, families, and the school with businesses, agencies, and other groups, and provide services to the community.

#### **Type I: Parenting**

- Provide parents with information on housing, nutrition, clothing, and safety.
- Aid teachers in understanding diverse family backgrounds, cultures, and linguistic needs.
- Support parents' understanding on agerelated child development needs and milestones.
- Share effective strategies with parents in creating healthy home environments that support children's learning.

#### **Parenting-in-Action Programs**

- Santa Clara County Office of Education's Trainer-of-Trainers Program
- Berryessa District's parent partnership programs
- Berryessa Parent University
- Group shares on added activities

#### **Type 4: Learning at Home**

- Provide parents with strategies to help their children with homework and academic enrichment activities.
- Define academic standards and skills required for parents to support children's mastery of grade level academic subjects.
- Support parents in understanding and determining curricular-related decisions for children.
- Provide guidance to parents in supporting children's skill development and talents through home-based enrichment activities.

#### **Type 3: Volunteering**

- Provide parents with opportunities to support staff and students as classroom aides, student tutors, coaches, and field trip chaperones.
- Provide extended school day academic enrichment opportunities for parents to support students' learning.
- Encourage parents to develop and attend students' assemblies, performances, sports events, and recognition celebrations.

#### **Added Parent Leadership Roles**

- Parents support the School Site Council.
- Parents serve on advisory committees.
- Parents support partnerships for added services beyond the school day:
  - After-school programs
  - Weekend school-community service projects
- Parents leverage and provide resources.





#### Planning for Parent Engagement

- Consider current school site activities.
- Identify additional parent needs.
- Determine timeline.
- Explore community partnerships:
  - Santa Clara County Office of Education
  - Parent Project Senior
  - San Jose Police Department
  - Community agencies



## Teacher Considerations for Parent Education and Partnership

- Consider how to effectively use parent volunteers:
  - At the school site
  - In the classroom
- Create a volunteer schedule of activities.
- Define jobs for parent volunteers.
- Integrate cultural enrichment activities.
- Use family literacy strategies.



### Multicultural Recruitment Considerations

- Consider cultural norms, values, and practices:
  - Styles of communicating
  - Structural barriers
- Recruit through appropriate communication channels:
  - Newsletters, phone calls, and parent coffees
  - Bulletins, flyers, and banners posted at schools
- Build a culture of caring.



#### **How to Overcome Difficult Situations**

- Teachers and parents must agree on participation assignments and schedules.
- Parents must acquire the skills to become effective volunteers.
- Impact can support parents' and a community's economic growth.
