- **1.** Welcome, Introductions and Announcements Mary Ann Burke, Santa Clara COE Introductions were made and Mary Ann reviewed agenda.
- 2. Updates from Family Area Network Nancy Bodenhausen, CDE Consultant
 - Family Engagement Framework has been released for California and is linked on the CDE parent involvement website.
 - Title I Conference is receiving workshop presenter proposals and those will be reviewed and approved by mid-July.
 - The Center for Family, School, Community Engagement at San Diego State University has created a flyer for distribution that highlights the mission, structure, and function of the newly developed organization.
- 3. Parent Engagement Leadership Initiative Ellen Larson and Melissa Bazanos, Riverside COE
 - The initiative was created in partnership with the 23rd District PTA using Epstein's framework.
 - The COE superintendent challenged the district PTA to distribute parent involvement pocket pal informational packets to parents of 420,000 students. The informational packet serves as a model for the California PTA.
 - The COE superintendent assigned an employee to create eight training modules for parents, educators, and community members that are offered to districts in the county. School site teams are trained and include members of various parent school site committees (i.e. SSC, ELAC, Advocacy).
 - The training modules are based on Epstein's research and focus on effective parent engagement activities both at home and at school including families having dinner together and parents sharing reading time with their children.
 - Ten districts have participated in the module trainings since 2009 with over 1,500 parent participants to date.
 - Annual meeting summits focus on parent engagement strategies that lead to student achievement.

4. CISC Regional Representative Reports – Mary Ann Burke, Santa Clara COE and CISC Regional Liaisons Regional updates include the following:

Region 1 – Sonoma COE: On May 8, the COE will provide a Parent Leadership Institute on how parents can participate in their children's schools and support them academically at home with follow-up trainings provided by PIQUE for limited English parents.

Region 2 – Tehama COE: On April 26, the COE provided training to 50 parents on effective parent engagement strategies and partnerships to support strategic planning. The training included a review of the Epstein framework for parent involvement. Workshop attendees included teachers and administrators and all participated in a school walk-through that focused on family friendly environments. The COE is seeking future training funding from Walmart, Lowes, Rotary Clubs, and Key Clubs.

Region 4 – Solano COE: The COE provided a series of parent engagement trainings that focused on gang awareness in the fall, bullying prevention in March, and CELDT training in spring with strategies on how parents can support their children at home.

Region 5 – Santa Clara COE: Santa Clara County parent engagement activities included sponsoring three regional parent engagement conferences for the year. Ongoing technical support was provided to 157 trained parent leaders and three interns that supported the facilitation of 285 parent training workshops in Santa Clara County on student achievement to 6,516 parents and community members. The staff is planning a best practices forum on September 29 for district administrators, teachers, program support staff, and parent leaders in addition to providing ongoing K-8 and Secondary Trainers of Trainer spring and fall conferences.

Region 11 - Los Angeles COE: LACOE will be taking two of its divisions (Division for School Improvement and Parent and Community Services Branch (PCSB)) and merging its units with other LACOE divisions. PCSB and Early Childhood Education Services (ECE) will integrate into other LACOE offices. The home division for PCSB has yet to be determined. This division will be coordinating Family Engagement with pre-school services and other COE services. County-wide, LA County is moving forward with a strengthening families' initiative. The first part of this initiative will focus on families with young children. Later, the initiative will move to a framework serving school-age children and families over time. This county-wide initiative will focus on using five specific protective factors that include 1) Parental Resilience, 2) Social Connections, 3) Concrete Support in Times of Need, 4) Knowledge of Parenting and Child Development, and 5) Social and Emotional Competence of Children. Helping inform this process is the Center for the Study of Special Policy. To learn more go to http://ceo.lacounty.gov/ccp/sflc about.htm LACOE Head Start is working to align their family engagement strategies with the newly released Head Start Parent, Family, and Community Engagement Framework Promoting Family Engagement and School Readiness, from Prenatal to age 8 created by the U.S. Department of Health and Human Services Administration for Children and Families Office. Training programs are based on Dr. Joyce Epstein's "Six Keys of Parent Involvement" and include information on parenting, communicating, volunteering, learning at home, decision making, and collaborating with the community. Additionally, information from the California State PTA Parents Empowering Parents (PEP) Guide and other PTA resources are shared.



HOW THE PELI TRAINING SERIES WORKS...

Modules are presented in a Trainer of Trainers format to develop a cadre of parent and family involvement leaders throughout the county. The PELI Training Modules are designed to cover all areas of parent engagement in an eight week series and to prepare parent leaders to lead presentations at their own school site. The additional PELI Training Modules are designed to inform parent leaders and trainers about specific areas of parent involvement and public education.

WHO SHOULD ATTEND ...

Participants are encouraged to attend the training series in teams. Teams are defined as an administrator, a teacher, and parent leaders (members from PTA/PTO, School Site Council, English Language Advisory Council).

COST AND FUNDING SOURCES...

Fees for the PELI Training Modules are \$50.00 per person, per eight week series and \$5.00 per person for each additional PELI Training Module.

Funding sources can include Title 1 funds, PTA/PTO resources, and grants.

Districts that provide reprographic services will not be charged a registration fee.



ASSUMPTIONS

- From the time a child is born, parents are a child's first teachers and provide the primary educational environment.
- > A family's formal and informal cultural and academic enrichment activities at home should be integrated into a school's parent engagement program.
- > Parent involvement continues to have positive effects through high school and is more important to student success than a family's income or education.
- > Parents are capable of understanding grade level academic content standards and applying them into home-based academic enrichment activities.
- Students with involved parents are more likely to do better at school, stay in school longer, and like school better.
- School-based parent engagement framework models focus on a school's readiness to engage parents in their school's curriculum and daily programs.
- Parent involvement is a two-way empowering, culturally relevant, and respectful partnership with educators making our children's success a priority in school and beyond.
- Effective parent engagement can contribute to a family's own economic development and the economic development within a community through job training skills and career development support services.
- > Parent involvement closes the gap between educational institutions and parents to support and promote student academic achievement.

REGION V PARENT ENGAGEMENT INITIATIVE

Recognizing the critical role that parental involvement plays in student success, the Santa Clara County Office of Education began the Region V Parent Engagement Initiative to provide parents with the tools to support their children's academic achievement – and then teach other parents to do the same.



Launched in the 2010-11 school year, the initiative empowers parents to improve student achievement by addressing the academic, discipline, nutrition and safety needs of their children. Participants in the initiative's robust offering of trainings and workshops learn multiple and specific strategies to support their children's needs. A multi-tiered program allows parents a chance to learn new techniques first, and then later practice their new

skills and improve their strategies through collaboration with other parents.

In its inaugural year, the initiative hosted three conferences each with a specific focus, which combined drew nearly 900 participants from local school districts. More than 2,100 mostly parent participants from 18 school districts in the region attended 80 subsequent follow-up workshops. An evaluation of the initiative's first year is available. District Annual Membership in **Advanced Parent Leader Trainings**

As the Parent Engagement Initiative expanded to 3 regional conferences and 278 workshops (with over 6,000 participants) in the last school year, the need for advanced parent leader trainings became critical. This new advanced training increases skill development and coaching opportunities through participation in state-wide webinars with the California Department of Education consultants and regional parent leaders.

Parent Ambassadors have a wide range of responsibilities involving conferences, workshops and class schedules. Annual stipend is \$500.

Parent Coaches have the same responsibilities as Parent Ambassadors, but also provide coaching, lead advisory team meetings, present regional conferences, provide parent trainings and convene focus groups. Annual stipend is \$1,000.



I was refered to you by Nancy Bodenhausen at CDE, in your role as facilitator of the Regional Partnerships Network. I met you at FAN meetings in Sacramento several years ago, and I'm pleased to be currently working on family engagement as part of my work at the Region IX Equity Assistance Center at WestEd. I'm writing to ask for your assistance in disseminating information about the rights of undocumented students in public education.

The Equity Assistance Centers across the U.S. will be publishing a bulletin this summer, to assist districts in reminding the community as well as school staff about the rights of undocumented students to enroll in public schools. The bulletin will summarize the points from the Supreme Court ruling in 1982, Plyler vs. Doe, and the information in the Dear Colleague letter from the Department of Education in May, 2011. We will try to send it to all districts in the state, and we're hoping you could help us by distributing it to the Network as well.

Any other suggestions of organizations to contact would be appreciated; we'd like to distribute this as widely as possible. Equal Access to Content Instruction for English Learners: An Example from Science

A new paper by Zoe Ann Brown and Kathy DiRanna

wake-up call to educators at every level and issued a broad challenge to work together to address educational inequities. Some of

the key findings are:

African-American students, particularly males, are far more likely to be suspended or expelled from school than their peers. Black students make up 18% of the students in the CRDC sample, but 35% of the students suspended once, and 39% of the students expelled.

Students learning English (ELL) were 6% of the CRDC high school enrollment, but made up 12% of students retained.

Only 29% of high-minority high schools offered Calculus, compared to 55% of schools with the lowest black and Hispanic enrollment.
