


Crafting a Statement of Inclusion for Asian American and Pacific Islander Students

Collectivizing knowledge, finalizing our statement

Our Work So Far: Theoretical Grounding

- Definitions: anti-racism, racial justice, anti-Asian racism
- Current Moment: anti-Asian scapegoating and violence
- Racialized Position: model minority and perpetual foreigner
- Racial Relationality: racial triangulation of AAs







Our Work So Far: Courageous Conversations

Rooted in your experiences as advocates:

- Needs of AA and PI students in your school
- Challenges you have with advocacy
- Institutional support you could use
- Responding to resistance

Our Work So Far: The Questions We've Discussed

- 1. How has the surge in anti-Asian racism with COVID affected your work as an advocate for Asian American students and racial equity? (11.9.20)
- 1. What's been most tricky for you to handle as an advocate for Asian American students in the context of racial equity? (11.9.20)
- 1. What other questions OR concerns do you have? (11.9.20)
- 1. What are the unaddressed or overlooked needs of AA and PI students in your school or district? (2.11.21)
- 1. What kind of institutional support would make it easier for you to be an effective advocate for AA and PI students in your school? (2.11.21)

Notes

- Be more explicit about what institutional support could look like driving action: e.g. affinity groups? PD? opportunities for students?
- Context for # of students impacted and share data about who the students are.
- Drive action: Dashboard could reflect diversity of AAPI demographic.
- Add "students and families"
- Use "equity and social justice", racial justice

- Promote ethnic studies as a way to dismantle stereotypes
- Name the institutional supports available for students: e.g. k-5, 6-12 supports; what already exists?; what is currently being taught in curriculum re AAPI history/culture; what can we provide teachers to help them understand students' unique experiences?
- Identify intended audience of the statement
- What are actions the SCCOE could commit to as a model for districts and schools?



2. Is there anything missing that you feel would be important to include in the statement?

Notes

- Ongoing monitoring of the actions ensuring that equity is being operationalized
- Celebration and pride
- Name the obstacles faced by AAPI students (e.g. "model minority")
- More specificity about the diversity of AAPI (e.g. SES)
- Outline institutional supports and how to operationalize for students
- Include staff (in addition to students and families)

Potential Priority Areas for 2021-22

- 1. Honoring AAPI's name and identity (being seen, being heard) e.g. My Name, My Identity
- 2. Training on implicit bias
- 3. Training on understanding the diversity of AAPI e.g., Arts Education, Culturally Responsive Teaching



Potential Priority Areas for 2021-22

- 4. Create cultural affinity groups (Educators & Students)
- 5. More celebration of AAPI cultures in schools
- 6. Increase AAPI students' visibility in curriculum e.g., ethnic studies
- 7. Social Emotional Learning Training



Potential Priority Areas for 2021-22

- 8. Nurture AAPI educators to aim for leadership roles
- Increase the number of teachers and school leaders
- 10.Promote the need to disaggregate data for AAPI student outcomes
