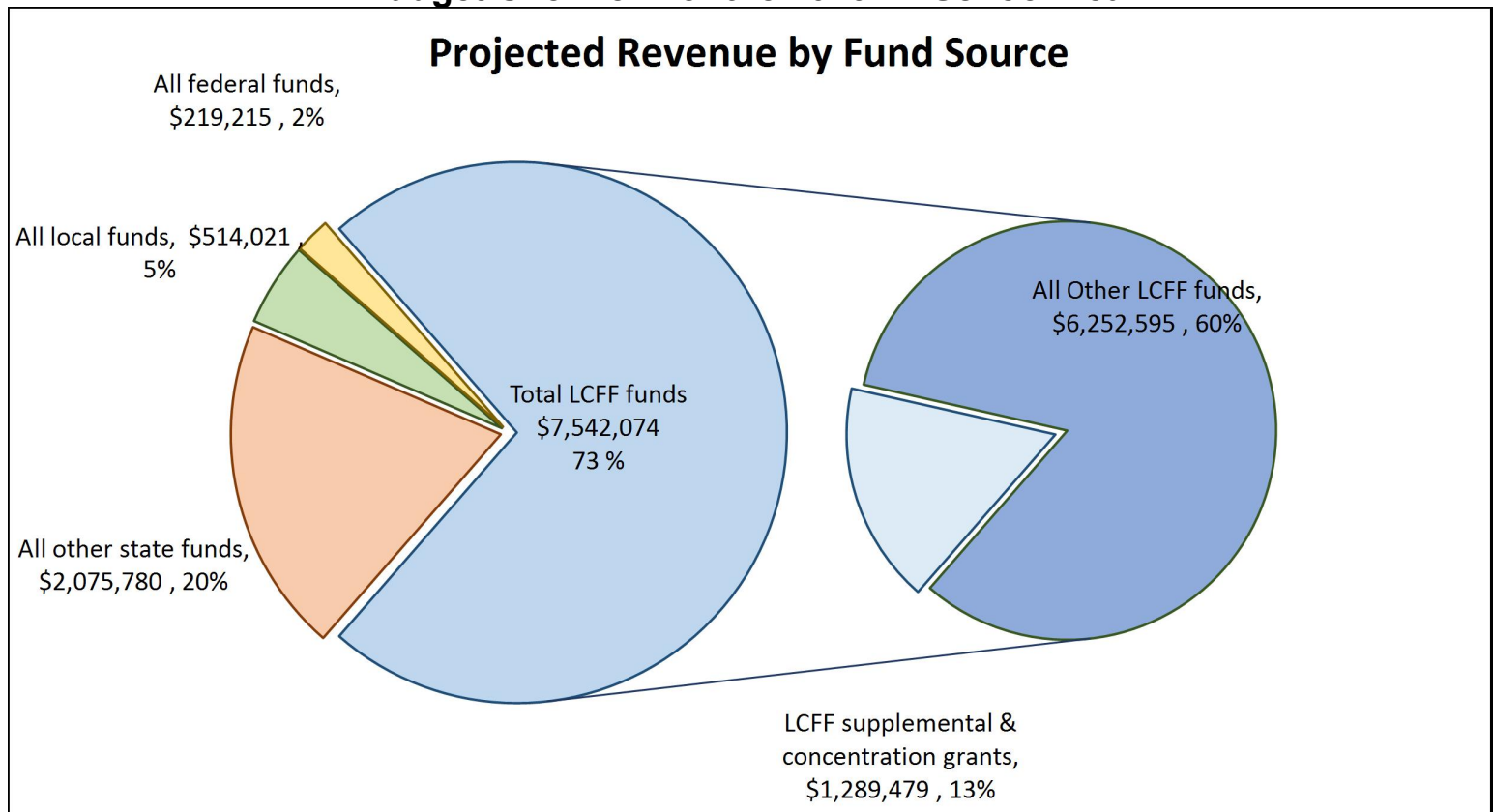

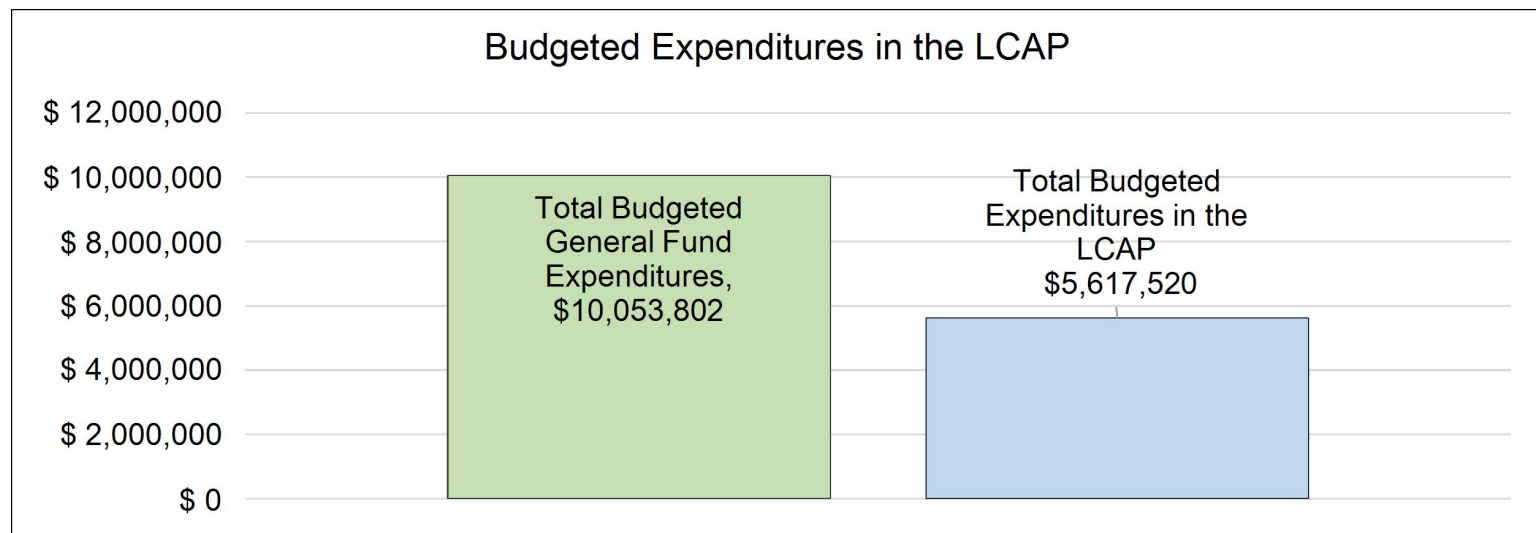


This chart shows the total general purpose revenue Alpha: Cornerstone Academy Preparatory expects to receive in the coming year from all sources.

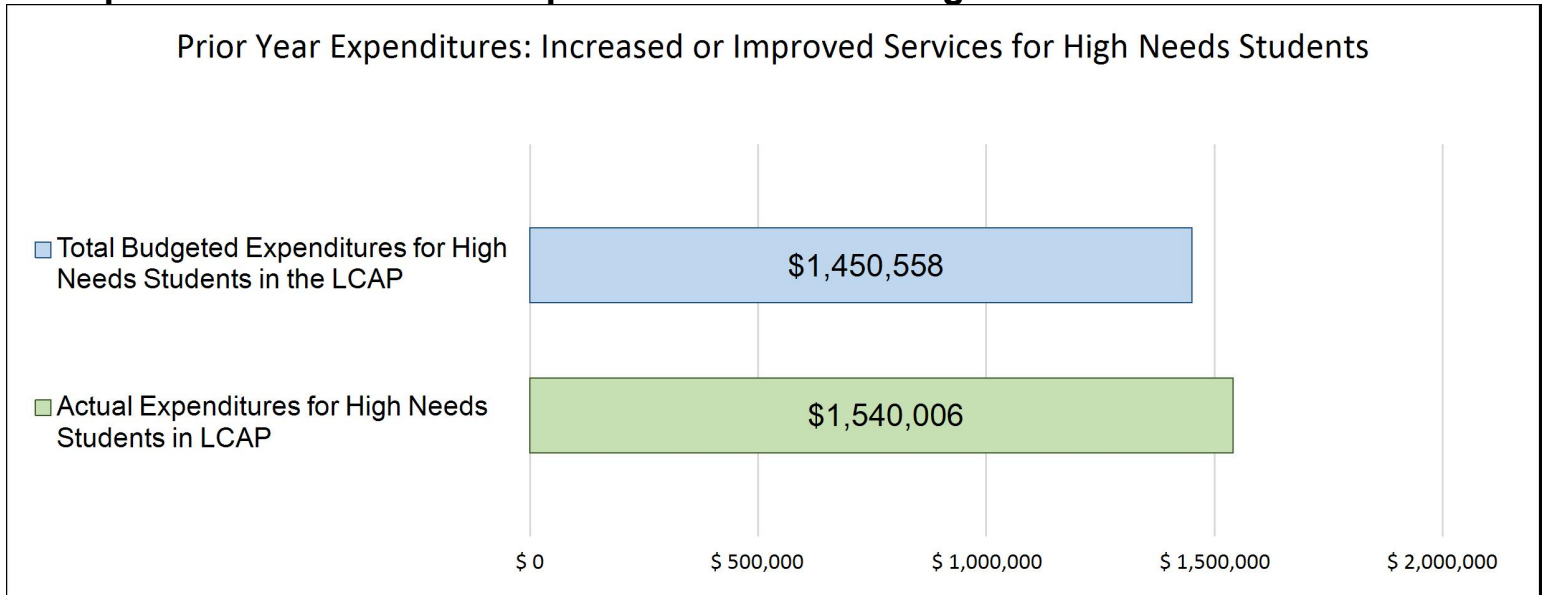

Plan Summary [2026-27]

General Information

Alpha: Cornerstone Academy Preparatory School (CAPS) is part of the Alpha Public Schools network, whose mission is: We believe that all children have a fundamental right to an excellent education. Alpha Public Schools will ensure that all of our students develop the academic skills and leadership habits required to succeed in college and live with integrity.

CAPS is led by principal Fallon Housman and staffed by a talented and energetic staff. CAPS is a small, safe, and tuition-free public charter school that serves students in grades TK-8. The school is located in the Little Saigon community of San Jose and serves a large Vietnamese and Latino population. CAPS serves approximately 568 students, 63% of whom are socioeconomically disadvantaged. The school’s demographic profile is 51.8% Asian, 35.9% Latino, 5.3% Filipino, 2.8% Two or More Races, 2.6% White, 1.6% African American. We serve a student body that is 22.4% English Learners and 10.9% Students with Disabilities (Source: 25-26 Dataquest). CAPS has a strong, active parent community that supports the school through volunteer work and hosting community events.

CAPS operates on two central guiding beliefs: (1) A college preparatory education begins in kindergarten and (2) literacy and mathematics are the cornerstones of a strong elementary education. Technology is integrated into the curriculum (1:1 in all grades) and students participate in various elective classes in addition to their core subject classes.

Cornerstone is located in the Franklin McKinley School District and is authorized by the Santa Clara County Office of Education (SCCOE)

Reflections: Annual Performance

A reflection on annual performance based on a review of the California School Dashboard (Dashboard) and local data.

As we reflect on our annual performance, Alpha: Cornerstone Academy Preparatory remains committed to evaluating our progress using data from the California School Dashboard and local data. This year's data tells a story of broad-based strength - with Green or Blue performance levels across nearly every indicator and Accelerated growth in both ELA and Mathematics. We also recognize areas where specific student groups need additional support. Based on the 2025 CA School Dashboard, our strengths and growth areas are as follows:

- **Accelerated Growth in Both ELA and Mathematics:** 79.9% of students improved their ELA scores from the prior year, earning an Accelerated growth designation, and 78.2% improved their math scores, also earning Accelerated growth. In ELA, five student groups achieved Accelerated growth, with one at Moderate and one at Average. In Mathematics, four groups achieved Accelerated growth, one achieved Exceptional, and two achieved Average. This dual-subject Accelerated growth across nearly all student groups is among the strongest growth profiles in the Dashboard data and signals that instructional strategies are producing consistent year-over-year gains for students.
- **Above-Standard Proficiency in ELA and Mathematics:** ELA performance reached 25.9 points above standard, receiving a Green performance level, and Mathematics reached 11.4 points above standard, also earning Green. Asian students achieved a Blue performance level in both subjects, at 69.0 points above standard in ELA and 69.3 points above standard in Mathematics. English Learners showed meaningful growth in Math, increasing 16.2 points to 17.5 points below standard (Green), and Socioeconomically Disadvantaged students increased 6.9 points to 13.9 points below standard (Green).
- **Continued Growth in English Learner Progress:** The English Learner Progress Indicator is Green, with 54.8% of English Learners making progress toward English language proficiency, representing an increase of 11.0% from the prior year. This growth reflects the impact of targeted English Language Development supports and continued focus on language acquisition for multilingual learners.
- **School Climate:** The Suspension Rate held at just 0.4%, receiving a Blue performance level, which was well below the state average of 2.9%. Asian students (0.0%), Hispanic students (0.5%), and Socioeconomically Disadvantaged students (0.6%) all earned Blue. English Learners earned Green at 0.6%. Chronic Absenteeism for All Students declined to 10.0%, receiving a Green performance level. The combination of near-zero suspensions and low absenteeism creates the conditions for learning that underpin our school's academic results.

We are encouraged by the strong outcomes reflected across the 2025 Dashboard indicators. At the same time, we recognize opportunities to further strengthen outcomes for specific student groups as part of our continuous improvement efforts.

- **ELA Performance Gaps for Hispanic Students and Students with Disabilities:** While overall ELA performance is above standard, Hispanic student performance declined 3.0 points to 41.1 points below standard, receiving an Orange performance level, and Students with Disabilities were at 74.0 points below standard (Orange), though they did increase by a noteworthy 28.7 points. The ELA performance gap between these student groups and our all student population is an essential area of focus for our school.
- **Chronic Absenteeism for Students with Disabilities:** Students with Disabilities had a chronic absenteeism rate of 23.9%, receiving an Orange performance level. While this represents a 10.0-point improvement from the prior year and outperforms the state average for Students with Disabilities, it remains well above the school's overall rate of 10.0%. This is the only student group with an Orange designation in chronic absenteeism, signaling the need for continued targeted attendance intervention strategies.

- Suspension Rate for Students with Disabilities: Students with Disabilities saw a 2.9-point increase in suspension rate, receiving an Orange performance level which was the only student group not in Green or Blue. Strengthening individualized behavioral support plans, increasing coordination between special education and student support teams, and reviewing the root causes of both suspensions and absenteeism for this population will continue to be a focus in SY 26-27.

A description of how the adopted LCAP was influenced by the feedback provided by educational partners.

Educational partner feedback gathered through surveys, community engagement, meetings, and data reflection processes played an important role in shaping the development of the 2026–27 LCAP. Overall, educational partners expressed satisfaction with the school’s

current goals, actions, and the progress being made toward improving student outcomes, school culture, and family engagement. Feedback from students, families, and staff reflected a strong sense of community and support across the school.

Student survey results demonstrated highly positive perceptions of school climate and connectedness. During the 2025–26 school year, 93.97% of students responded favorably to the survey question measuring student safety, while 95.57% of students responded favorably to the statement, “I feel that there is at least one adult who cares about me.” Family survey data similarly reflected strong positive perceptions of the school community, with 96.67% of families reporting a strong sense of belonging and connectedness to the school community, 91.53% agreeing that the school listens to family voice and input when making decisions, 96.72% reporting satisfaction with opportunities to engage in school activities and programs, and 93.33% reporting satisfaction with the level of physical and emotional safety at the school.

Additional feedback gathered throughout the year reinforced these strengths. Students, families, and teachers consistently shared positive feedback regarding the school culture. Families expressed appreciation for the school’s communication systems, including Konstella, and shared that staff consistently create a welcoming environment for students and families. Students shared excitement about electives, field trips, extracurricular opportunities, and school events, while teachers expressed appreciation for the support provided by instructional coaches and peers. Stakeholders also highlighted the implementation of designated and integrated ELD supports, the use of language supports such as sentence stems and anchor charts, strong student engagement, and the positive school climate as bright spots across the campus.

While educational partners expressed overall satisfaction with the school’s direction and progress, engagement and data reflection also identified several opportunities for refinement and continuous improvement within the adopted LCAP.

As a result, Goal 2 Action 2.2 (Assessment Strategy) was refined to include the implementation of the DIBELS assessment to strengthen early literacy screening, foundational reading data collection, and progress monitoring systems. Educational partners emphasized the importance of stronger early literacy systems and more actionable student data to support differentiated instruction and earlier identification of student needs. This update is intended to further strengthen the school’s data-driven instructional systems while maintaining alignment with the overall goal of supporting student growth through effective teaching and assessment practices.

Additionally, Action 1.4 was updated and renamed “academic intervention model” to reflect a more intentional and structured implementation of intervention supports. Beginning next year, intervention services will take place during a dedicated “REACH” block, allowing students to receive consistent, targeted small group instructional support aligned to their individual academic needs. This adjustment was informed by feedback emphasizing the importance of differentiated support, targeted intervention, and stronger systems for addressing varying student learning needs. This refinement is intended to strengthen the effectiveness and consistency of intervention systems while maintaining alignment with the overall goal of improving outcomes for all student groups.

An explanation of why the LEA has developed this goal.

The rationale for establishing the academic goal focused on our subgroups, particularly in English Language Arts (ELA) and Math, is grounded in our commitment to equity and the urgent need to address the educational disparities exacerbated by the pandemic. The pandemic's impact on education has been profound and uneven, with our subgroups, including English Learners, Students with Disabilities, Socioeconomically Disadvantaged students, and Hispanic students, facing significant challenges that have resulted in disproportionate outcomes compared to their peers. On the 2023 CA Dashboard, we identified that our Students with Disabilities were Red in ELA and Math, and our subgroup performance was below our performance for all student groups. These results have driven our intense focus on supporting growth for our significant student groups.

Our decision to prioritize this goal is in direct response to feedback from our educational partners, including teachers, staff, and parents, who have consistently emphasized the necessity of improving academic outcomes for these subgroups. The collective insights gathered through the LCAP engagement process highlighted a shared understanding that targeted efforts are needed to ensure all students have equitable opportunities to succeed.

To address these disparities, we are committed to implementing comprehensive strategies that include enhancing our Tier 1 instructional practices to ensure a strong foundation of quality teaching and learning for all students. We recognize the importance of specialized intervention programs that provide additional support to students who are not meeting standards. Our approach includes strengthening English Language Development (ELD) support to better assist English Learners in achieving proficiency in ELA, and enhancing academic and behavioral supports for students with special education needs. These targeted interventions are designed to address the specific learning gaps and challenges faced by these students.

Our commitment to this goal is data-driven, relying on comprehensive analysis to identify the areas of greatest need and to monitor the effectiveness of our interventions. Through continuous assessment and reflection, we will adapt our strategies to ensure they are meeting the intended objectives and making a measurable impact on student outcomes.

Goal Analysis [2025-26]

An analysis of how this goal was carried out in the previous year.

A description of overall implementation, including any substantive differences in planned actions and actual implementation of these actions, and any relevant challenges and successes experienced with implementation.

During the 2025–26 school year, all actions identified under Goal 1 were implemented as planned, with no substantive differences between intended and actual implementation. The school maintained a strong focus on ensuring that all student groups—particularly English Learners, Students with Disabilities, and other historically underserved populations—received targeted, high-quality instruction and supports in English Language Arts and Mathematics. Implementation was characterized by coherence across Tier 1 instruction, intervention systems, and professional learning structures, with a continued emphasis on data-driven decision-making.

A key area of growth this year was the expansion and strengthening of English Learner supports (Actions 1.1 and 1.2). Unlike the prior year, the school successfully staffed a dedicated ELD Specialist, which significantly increased the school’s capacity to deliver both designated and integrated ELD instruction. The ELD Specialist worked directly with students in grades 3–8 and supported teachers through coaching, walkthroughs, and observations to ensure effective implementation of ELD strategies. In grades TK–2, designated ELD time was built into the master schedule, ensuring that younger students received consistent and structured language development support. Additionally, the ELD Specialist supported continued staff focus on ELD strategies through actions including sharing a specific ELD strategy weekly in all-staff Huddles and regularly sharing resources for teachers to leverage in their classrooms. These structures supported stronger alignment between the ELD curriculum, teacher practice, and student needs.

Supports for Students with Disabilities (Action 1.3) were implemented as intended, with a focus on providing access to grade-level content through inclusive practices, small group intervention, and structured collaboration between general education and special education staff. Regular data analysis and collaborative planning ensured that accommodations and interventions were aligned to student needs, while targeted SEL supports were provided to address barriers to academic progress.

The school also effectively implemented a multi-tiered intervention system (Actions 1.4 and 1.5), including the use of Academic Interventionists and supplemental high-dosage tutoring. Academic Interventionists provided both push-in and pull-out support, delivered small group instruction, and collaborated closely with classroom teachers to respond to student data. Supplemental intervention efforts were strategically focused on foundational literacy, particularly in grades K–3, reflecting the school’s prioritization of early literacy development. This targeted approach allowed the school to address foundational skill gaps and better position students for long-term academic success.

Tier 1 instructional improvement (Action 1.6) remained a central focus throughout the year. The school invested heavily in coaching and professional development aligned to Alpha-wide priorities, including learning design, standards-aligned instruction, and the use of data to

inform planning for student subgroups. Coaching structures were strengthened to support teachers in implementing rigorous Tier 1 instruction with access and in monitoring the effectiveness of those strategies. This emphasis on coaching and the implementation of our high quality instructional materials with fidelity represented a key success in implementation, as it built teacher capacity to meet diverse student needs within the core classroom.

Overall, implementation of Goal 1 actions was strong and consistent across the school as it works to continue to build systems that support improved outcomes for all student groups. Key successes included the addition of dedicated ELD staffing, the strengthening of professional learning structures, and a clear focus on foundational literacy and Tier 1 instructional quality.

The actions implemented under Goal 1 have been effective in driving measurable progress across student groups in English Language Arts, Mathematics, and English Learner Progress, with particularly strong gains among Students with Disabilities and English Learners. Overall, multiple student groups demonstrated growth, including movement out of the Red performance level in both ELA and Math for Students with Disabilities for the first time in three years, indicating meaningful progress toward closing achievement gaps.

In English Language Arts, student group data reflects positive momentum across several groups. Most notably, Students with Disabilities demonstrated significant growth, increasing by 28.7 points and moving out of Red, signaling a major improvement in access to and mastery of grade-level content. English Learners also showed improvement, increasing by 4.7 points, while Socioeconomically Disadvantaged students maintained performance above standard. These outcomes reflect the effectiveness of Specialized Academic Instruction and small group intervention structures (Action 1.3), along with the targeted use of Academic Interventionists to provide differentiated, data-driven support (Action 1.4). Additionally, the implementation of ELD supports and high-quality ELD curriculum (Actions 1.1 and 1.2) contributed to improved access for English Learners through designated instruction, integrated supports, and teacher professional development.

In Mathematics, student group outcomes demonstrate strong and accelerated growth across multiple groups. Students with Disabilities increased by 38.1 points, moving out of Red and into Yellow, marking a significant milestone for our students with disabilities. English Learners showed substantial growth of 16.2 points, moving into Green, and Socioeconomically Disadvantaged students also moved into Green, reflecting broad improvement across key groups. These gains are directly tied to the implementation of tiered intervention systems and targeted small group instruction (Actions 1.4 and 1.5), as well as strengthened Tier 1 instructional practices and data-driven planning (Action 1.6), which ensured students received both rigorous instruction and differentiated support aligned to their needs.

Actions tied to the English Learner Progress Indicator also demonstrated strong effectiveness, with 54.8% of English Learners making progress, an increase of 11 percentage points and exceeding the state average, resulting in Green performance. This growth reflects the success of expanded ELD supports and curriculum implementation (Actions 1.1 and 1.2), including the addition of an ELD Specialist,

structured designated ELD instruction, and ongoing professional development and observations of ELD classes. These efforts strengthened both language development and access to core academic content.

While overall student group performance shows clear improvement, Long-Term English Learners (LTELs) remain an area for continued growth, as indicated by declines in both ELA and Math. In response, the school has strengthened clarity around reclassification expectations and criteria, supporting both teachers and students in setting clear goals for progress. Additionally, ongoing co-observations of ELD instruction by network leadership are being used to refine implementation and ensure greater consistency and impact moving forward. These efforts are aligned to further strengthen ELD implementation (Actions 1.1 and 1.2) and improve outcomes for LTEL students.

Overall, the effectiveness of Goal 1 actions is evident in the strong growth across student groups, particularly for Students with Disabilities and English Learners. The combination of targeted interventions, strengthened ELD systems, and strong Tier 1 instruction has contributed to narrowing achievement gaps and accelerating progress toward meeting or exceeding standards for all student groups.

A description of any changes made to the planned goal, metrics, target outcomes, or actions for the coming year that resulted from reflections on prior practice.

Following a year of strong student growth in English Language Arts and Mathematics across student groups, along with achieving a Green performance level on the English Learner Progress Indicator (ELPI), the school will maintain the overall Goal 1 focus, metrics, and target outcomes for the coming year. Feedback from educational partners further reinforced that the current goal and actions are critical to effectively supporting student achievement.

One refinement for the upcoming year is a targeted update to Action 1.4, which will be renamed “Academic Intervention Model”. While the core focus on small group intervention remains the same, this update reflects a more intentional and structured implementation. Beginning next year, intervention will take place during a dedicated “REACH” block, allowing students to receive consistent, targeted small group instructional support aligned to their specific academic needs.

Additionally, we have removed the current Action 1.5: Supplemental Literacy Intervention due to sunsetting our partnership with our external tutoring program.

This adjustment is intended to strengthen the effectiveness and consistency of intervention systems while maintaining alignment with the overall goal of improving outcomes for all student groups.

Alpha is committed to supporting the growth and achievement for all students through strong instructional practices, informed by our assessment and data strategy. This goal underscores our dedication to providing a high-quality, comprehensive education that is tailored to the needs of our diverse student population, ensuring every student has the opportunity to excel.

Our 2023 CA School Dashboard ELA and Math outcomes for all students highlight the need to create this goal. While we are Green in ELA, we did see a drop in our DFS from 27.8 pts above standard to 15.9 pts above. We remain in the Yellow performance level for Math and are outperforming the State of California; however, we also saw a dip in our math performance. With the work currently taking place and the initiatives outlined in this new LCAP, we anticipate driving meaningful growth in our ELA and Math results.

By focusing on strong instructional practices, we are committed to delivering a rigorous, standards-aligned curriculum. Our assessment and data strategy will give us a structured process to gather meaningful data about student learning, which informs instructional decision-making and allows for targeted interventions when necessary. This data-driven approach enables us to identify gaps in learning, monitor progress, and adjust our teaching strategies to better meet the needs of each student.

Lastly, offering a broad course of study is fundamental to providing a whole academic experience that prepares students for future success. This means going beyond the core subjects to include the arts, sciences, technology, and other areas of study that foster a well-rounded education. By providing a diverse range of learning opportunities, we not only cater to the varied interests and talents of our students but also help them develop critical thinking, creativity, and other essential skills that are vital in today's world.

Goal Analysis [2025-26]

An analysis of how this goal was carried out in the previous year.

A description of overall implementation, including any substantive differences in planned actions and actual implementation of these actions, and any relevant challenges and successes experienced with implementation.

During the 2025–26 school year, all actions identified under Goal 2 were implemented with overall fidelity to the plan, with some intentional adjustments made to better meet staff needs and improve the effectiveness of data use and instructional support. The school maintained a strong focus on strengthening instructional practices, refining its assessment and data strategy, and ensuring all students had access to high-quality curriculum and instructional supports.

A central component of implementation was the strengthening of instructional practices through coaching and professional development (Action 2.1). Teachers engaged in differentiated professional learning aligned to Alpha’s Teacher Rubric and Vision of Excellent Teaching, with a strong emphasis on lesson planning, assessment alignment, and meeting the needs of diverse student groups. This work was reinforced through a structured observation and coaching cycle, in which each teacher participated in biweekly coaching cycles across core content areas. Teachers submitted lesson plans, received targeted feedback, were observed in practice, and then engaged in follow-up coaching conversations. This cycle allowed instructional leaders to closely monitor implementation of our high quality instructional materials and provide highly specific, actionable feedback, representing a key success in strengthening instructional quality.

The school continued to implement a comprehensive assessment strategy (Action 2.2), including the use of standardized assessments such as CAASPP, NWEA MAP, and curricular assessments. In grades K–2, the school introduced DIBELS as a new early literacy assessment, replacing prior tools to better align with foundational literacy goals. While initial DIBELS baseline assessments were successfully administered, the full reassessment cycle has not yet been completed, representing an area for continued development in ensuring consistent progress monitoring.

Implementation of high-quality curriculum (Action 2.3) remained consistent across content areas, with teachers utilizing adopted materials such as CKLA, StudySync, Eureka Math, Amplify Science, and EL Achieve. Ongoing professional development and coaching supported teachers in internalizing curriculum and delivering standards-aligned instruction. Coaching and observation cycles were used to monitor fidelity of implementation and provide feedback to strengthen instructional delivery.

The school also refined its data strategy (Action 2.4) to better align with staff feedback and instructional priorities. While weekly data meetings were held in the prior year, the school shifted to embedding data analysis within individualized coaching sessions, allowing for more targeted and actionable conversations tied directly to classroom practice. In addition, the School Leadership Team maintained a monthly cadence of data analysis to review trends and inform schoolwide decisions. This shift represents a strategic adjustment rather than a deviation from the plan, aimed at improving the effectiveness and relevance of data use for teachers.

Access to technology and online platforms (Action 2.5) was maintained through a 1:1 device program and the provision of online learning tools to support both in-class and at-home learning. These resources supported differentiated instruction and increased access for students, particularly those requiring additional practice or support.

Associate Teachers (Action 2.6) were staffed to provide additional classroom and small group support; however, staffing changes, including leaves of absence, resulted in some shifts in how this support was delivered. One Associate Teacher was on leave, and another supported coverage needs. Despite this, the school maintained continuity of instruction and leveraged available staff to minimize disruption to student learning.

Finally, the school continued to provide a broad course of study (Action 2.7), including physical education and visual and performing arts, while ensuring that English Learners and Students with Disabilities received appropriate supports through integrated and designated ELD, as well as specialized services.

Overall, implementation of Goal 2 actions was strong, with key successes in accountability around the observation cycle and the use of our high quality instructional materials with fidelity. Adjustments to data practices and staffing structures were made thoughtfully to better support teachers and students and the school maintained fidelity to its core strategies and continued to strengthen systems that support student growth and achievement.

A description of the effectiveness or ineffectiveness of the specific actions to date in making progress toward the goal.

The actions implemented under Goal 2 have been effective in supporting overall student growth in English Language Arts and Mathematics through strengthened instructional practices, aligned curriculum, and a refined assessment and data strategy. For All Students, the school maintained Green performance in ELA (25.9 points above standard) and demonstrated continued growth in Mathematics, improving by +5.5 points to 11.4 points above standard (Green). These outcomes reflect sustained progress toward meeting or exceeding standards and indicate that instructional systems are effectively supporting student achievement.

Growth in ELA and Math is closely tied to the school's investment in strengthening instructional practices (Action 2.1) and high-quality curriculum implementation (Action 2.3). The biweekly coaching cycles, including lesson plan submission, observations, and targeted feedback allowed instructional leaders to focus on key areas such as standards alignment, student engagement, and response to assessment data. This consistent coaching structure contributed to stronger Tier 1 instruction and more intentional planning for student mastery of grade-level standards. Additionally, the use of high-quality curriculum across content areas, supported by ongoing professional development and internalization practices, ensured that students had access to rigorous and aligned instructional materials. The school's assessment and data strategy (Actions 2.2 and 2.4) also contributed to improved outcomes. The continued use of standardized and curricular assessments provided regular insight into student progress, while the shift to individualized data analysis within coaching cycles allowed for more targeted and actionable instructional adjustments.

Access to instructional materials and learning resources remained a strength, with 100% of students having sufficient access to standards-aligned instructional materials, ensuring equitable access to high-quality learning experiences across all classrooms. Additionally, the

school's 1:1 technology environment and access to online learning platforms (Action 2.5) supported differentiated instruction and extended learning opportunities beyond the classroom.

Overall, the effectiveness of Goal 2 actions is evident in the sustained high performance in ELA, continued growth in Mathematics, and the consistent access to rigorous instructional materials. The alignment of coaching, curriculum, and data systems has strengthened instructional quality and positioned the school for continued improvement in student outcomes.

A description of any changes made to the planned goal, metrics, target outcomes, or actions for the coming year that resulted from reflections on prior practice.

Following continued strong performance in English Language Arts and Mathematics, with overall outcomes remaining in the Green performance level, the school will maintain the existing Goal 2 focus, metrics, target outcomes, and actions for the coming year. Educational partner feedback and internal reflection indicate that the current systems for instructional practices, assessment, and data use are effectively supporting student achievement.

The only refinement for the upcoming year is an enhancement to Action 2.2 (Assessment Strategy). The school will incorporate the DIBELS assessment to strengthen early literacy data collection and progress monitoring. This addition will provide more granular insight into foundational reading skills, allowing for more targeted instructional adjustments and earlier identification of student needs.

This update is intended to further strengthen the school's data-driven instructional systems while maintaining alignment with the overall goal of supporting student growth through effective teaching and assessment practices.

By focusing on these areas, we not only adhere to our educational mission but also lay the groundwork for our students to succeed in a post-pandemic world. This goal encapsulates our dedication to creating a resilient, supportive, and inclusive school environment that empowers every student to achieve their fullest potential. Our educational partners continue to emphasize the importance of the work toward maintaining a school environment where students feel safe and a sense of belonging. Throughout this new LCAP cycle, we will put resources, time, and development toward key initiatives, including restorative justice practices, positive behavioral interventions and supports (PBIS) systems, response to student culture and behavioral data, an SEL curriculum, and a robust attendance tracking system, among other actions highlighted throughout this goal.

Goal Analysis [2025-26]

An analysis of how this goal was carried out in the previous year.

A description of overall implementation, including any substantive differences in planned actions and actual implementation of these actions, and any relevant challenges and successes experienced with implementation.

During the 2025–26 school year, all actions identified under Goal 3 were implemented as planned, with no substantive differences between planned actions and actual implementation. The school maintained a strong focus on cultivating a healthy and thriving environment that promotes student belonging through aligned systems for behavior, social-emotional learning, attendance, and student engagement.

A key component of implementation was the continued development of systems to monitor and respond to student culture and behavior (Action 3.1). Although the Dean of Students was on leave for a portion of the year, systems remained in place through the broader leadership team. Upon return, the Dean increased time in classrooms to provide more proactive support for student behavior and to coach teachers on effective classroom management strategies. The school utilized tools such as DeansList, student culture surveys, and internal tracking systems to monitor trends in behavior. These data were regularly reviewed in School Leadership Team (SLT) meetings focused on

maintaining a healthy and thriving school environment, allowing the team to identify patterns and refine response systems, including referral procedures.

Social-emotional learning and restorative practices (Actions 3.2 and 3.3) were implemented consistently across the school. Staff engaged in professional development to support the integration of SEL into daily instruction and to strengthen restorative approaches to student behavior. A key success this year was the continued shift away from exclusionary discipline practices. The school prioritized understanding root causes of behavior and implementing restorative responses, such as reflective or learning-based consequences, rather than suspension whenever possible. This approach contributed to upholding a supportive and inclusive environment for students.

Attendance systems (Action 3.4) were also implemented with fidelity and strengthened through more proactive planning. The school analyzed prior-year attendance trends to identify months with historically lower attendance and implemented targeted strategies to address these patterns. Dedicated roles supported this work, including an Operations Manager serving as an attendance coordinator to monitor chronic absenteeism and conduct outreach to families, and an Office Assistant who contacted families daily when students were absent. The school also maintained structured attendance protocols, including data tracking, targeted interventions, and family engagement strategies, to improve overall attendance and address barriers to student participation.

The school continued to ensure that facilities remained clean, safe, and conducive to learning (Action 3.5), while also expanding opportunities for positive student experiences (Action 3.6), including events, sports, theatre, field trips, and student leadership opportunities that contributed to a strong sense of community and belonging. Expanded learning opportunities (Action 3.8), including partnerships, clubs, and extracurricular programming, were maintained to support student engagement beyond the core instructional day.

Nutrition and wellness supports (Action 3.9) were implemented through the continued operation of the National School Lunch Program and a monthly food bank in partnership with the Parent Learning Center, ensuring that students and families had access to essential resources. Additionally, the school maintained implementation of Positive Behavioral Interventions and Supports (PBIS) systems (Action 3.10), regularly monitoring effectiveness and reinforcing expectations for positive student behavior through value of the month, student store, and Scholar of the Week.

Overall, implementation of Goal 3 actions was strong and consistent. Key successes included strengthened data-driven behavior systems, a proactive and restorative approach to student discipline, and improved attendance structures. While staffing changes, such as the temporary absence of the Dean of Students, presented some challenges, the school effectively adapted to maintain continuity of support. These efforts collectively contributed to a healthy and thriving school environment for all students.

An explanation of material differences between Budgeted Expenditures and Estimated Actual Expenditures and/or Planned Percentages of Improved Services and Estimated Actual Percentages of Improved Services.

There were no material differences between Budgeted Expenditures and Estimated Actual Expenditures.

A description of the effectiveness or ineffectiveness of the specific actions to date in making progress toward the goal.

The actions implemented under Goal 3 have been effective in improving key indicators related to school culture, safety, and student engagement, as evidenced by reductions in both chronic absenteeism and suspension rates. These improvements reflect the impact of strengthened systems for monitoring student behavior, proactive attendance interventions, and a continued focus on restorative and inclusive practices.

Chronic absenteeism has decreased compared to the prior year, demonstrating the effectiveness of the school's refined attendance systems and targeted interventions (Action 3.4). The school's proactive approach—analyzing historical attendance trends, increasing family outreach, and leveraging dedicated roles to monitor and respond to attendance data—has contributed to improved outcomes. This is further reflected in the school's 96.07% Average Daily Attendance (ADA) as-of April 2026, indicating strong overall student engagement. While progress has been made, Students with Disabilities remain a focus area within chronic absenteeism, and the school continues to prioritize individualized supports, regular check-ins, and alignment with IEP goals to address attendance barriers for this group.

Suspension rates have also declined, reflecting the effectiveness of the school's investment in restorative practices and Positive Behavioral Interventions and Supports (Actions 3.3 and 3.10). The intentional focus on restorative approaches such as addressing root causes of behavior and implementing reflective or learning-based consequences has contributed to a supportive and inclusive school environment. These efforts have been reinforced through ongoing monitoring of behavior data (Action 3.1) and professional development for staff on restorative practices and classroom management strategies.

Additional indicators further reinforce the effectiveness of Goal 3 actions, including 93.97% of students responding favorably to the survey question measuring student safety and 95.57% students responding favorably to the question "I feel that there is at least 1 adult who cares about me". The school also maintained a 0% middle school dropout rate and 0% expulsion rate, highlighting strong student retention and a commitment to keeping students engaged in a safe and supportive learning environment. These outcomes reflect the combined impact of SEL implementation, student support systems, and efforts to foster a sense of belonging through positive school culture and student experiences (Actions 3.2 and 3.6).

Overall, the data indicate that Goal 3 actions have been effective in strengthening school climate, improving attendance, and maintaining a very low suspension rate. Focus will continue to be placed on lowering chronic absenteeism among student groups such as English Learners and Students with Disabilities. Overall, the school's systems and practices are yielding positive results and contributing to a healthier, more inclusive environment for all students.

A description of any changes made to the planned goal, metrics, target outcomes, or actions for the coming year that resulted from reflections on prior practice.

Based on reflection of implementation and effectiveness data from the 2025–26 school year, no significant changes will be made to the goals, actions, metrics, or expected outcomes for Goal 3 in the coming year. The school has observed positive outcomes, including reductions in chronic absenteeism and suspension rates, indicating that current systems and strategies are effectively supporting a safe and inclusive school environment. As the final year of the current LCAP cycle approaches, the school will maintain continuity of these actions while continuing to refine implementation. Ongoing focus will be placed on monitoring and continuing to reduce chronic absenteeism among student groups to ensure continued progress and equitable outcomes for all students.

Goal Analysis [2025-26]

An analysis of how this goal was carried out in the previous year.

A description of overall implementation, including any substantive differences in planned actions and actual implementation of these actions, and any relevant challenges and successes experienced with implementation.

During the 2025–26 school year, all actions identified under Goal 4 were implemented as planned, with no substantive differences between planned and actual implementation. The school maintained a strong focus on building and cultivating meaningful partnerships with families to support student achievement and wellness through consistent communication, community-building events, and expanded opportunities for family engagement and leadership.

Family communication systems (Action 4.1) were implemented with a focus on accessibility and responsiveness. The school leveraged a family communication platform to share updates and important information, while also providing paper-based communication to ensure access for all families. Communications were consistently translated into Spanish and Vietnamese to support the school’s diverse community, and staff with multilingual capacity, as well as translation services, ensured that families could engage meaningfully in conferences, meetings, and ongoing communication. The school also administered culture surveys multiple times throughout the year to gather authentic feedback and inform continuous improvement efforts.

School community events and celebrations (Action 4.2) were implemented as planned and served as a key strength in fostering family engagement and school connectedness. The school executed a variety of events aligned to an annual engagement plan, including Back to School Night, student conferences, award ceremonies, and community building events such as Culture Day, a Spelling Bee, STEAM Night, art shows, and science fairs. Attendance at these events was very high and tracked to continue to understand participation trends and inform future planning.

The school continued to provide programs and services through the Alpha Parent Learning Center (Action 4.3), offering families access to educational, career, and wellness resources that support their ability to engage as partners in their child's education. In addition, efforts to strengthen parent-school partnerships (Action 4.4) included expanding opportunities for family involvement through volunteering and participation in school activities.

Parent leadership and advocacy structures (Action 4.5) were also maintained and strengthened, with families participating in groups such as the School Site Council (SSC), English Language Advisory Committee (ELAC), Parent Leader Committee, and the Parent Association. These structures provided families with meaningful opportunities to contribute to school decision-making and advocate for student needs.

Overall, implementation of Goal 4 actions was strong and consistent. Key successes included maintaining accessible and multilingual communication systems, high levels of family participation in school events, and continued opportunities for parent leadership. These efforts contributed to a more connected school community and strengthened partnerships between families and the school.

The actions implemented under Goal 4 have been effective in strengthening family engagement, communication, and overall connection between the school and its community. Through consistent implementation of multilingual communication systems, expanded family events, and increased opportunities for parent leadership, the school has continued to build a strong sense of partnership with families in support of student achievement and wellness.

Family survey data indicates high levels of satisfaction and engagement across key measures. Specifically, 96.67% of families report feeling a strong sense of belonging and connectedness to the school community, reflecting the impact of consistent communication practices and inclusive community events (Actions 4.1 and 4.2). Additionally, 91.53% of families agree that the school listens to family voice and input when making decisions, demonstrating the effectiveness of leadership structures such as SSC, ELAC, and parent committees in elevating family perspectives (Action 4.5).

The school has also been effective in providing meaningful opportunities for family participation. 96.72% of families report satisfaction with the amount of opportunities to engage in school activities and programs (including by subgroup), indicating that events such as Culture Day,

STEAM Night, and family conferences are successfully fostering engagement across diverse groups (Actions 4.2 and 4.4). Furthermore, 93.33% of families report satisfaction with the level of physical and emotional safety at the school, reflecting the broader impact of a positive school culture and strong communication systems (Actions 4.1 and 3.1–3.3).

These outcomes are directly connected to the school’s intentional focus on accessible, multilingual communication, regular feedback collection through surveys, and the creation of inclusive spaces for families to engage and lead. The continued use of both digital and paper-based communication, along with translation supports, has ensured that all families—particularly those from historically underserved communities—can participate meaningfully in the school community.

Overall, the data indicate that Goal 4 actions have been effective in building strong family-school partnerships, increasing engagement, and fostering a sense of belonging and trust within the school community. These efforts have created a solid foundation for continued collaboration with families in support of student success.

Priority 1: Basic (Conditions of Learning)

An explanation of why the LEA has developed this goal.

Developing and retaining fully credentialed and high-quality educators is a critical enabler for student success. However, given the teacher shortage that we are experiencing in the Bay Area, it has grown increasingly competitive to hire and retain strong educators for our school. To address this, we have established the following theory of change at Alpha: If we develop excellent coaches, then they will develop excellent educators, which will result in improved student outcomes. Therefore, we are focused on continuing to invest heavily in internal and external professional development and coaching of our leaders, teachers, and instructional staff. We are creating leadership pathways for staff members to grow and stay at Alpha, we regularly review our compensation and benefits packages, and we are using a variety of recruitment strategies to attract high-quality talent to CAPS.

All of stakeholder groups, through the LCAP / initiative setting process, highlighted the need to continue this goal into our next 3-year cycle, which emphasizes the importance of hiring, developing, and retaining high quality faculty and staff as a key enabler in our success in achieving all of our other goals.

Goal Analysis [2025-26]

An analysis of how this goal was carried out in the previous year.

A description of overall implementation, including any substantive differences in planned actions and actual implementation of these actions, and any relevant challenges and successes experienced with implementation.

During the 2025–26 school year, all actions identified under Goal 5 were implemented as planned, with no substantive differences between planned and actual implementation. The school maintained a strong focus on hiring, developing, and retaining high-quality staff through aligned professional development systems, robust coaching structures, and intentional efforts to foster a positive and supportive adult culture.

A central component of implementation was the continued investment in teacher development through coaching and professional learning (Action 5.1). School Leadership Team (SLT) members conducted regular observations and 1:1 coaching meetings with teachers, aligned to Alpha’s Vision of Excellent Teaching and Teacher Rubric. These coaching cycles were closely connected to professional development sessions and grade-level or department meetings, creating a cohesive system for continuous improvement. Teachers received frequent, actionable feedback on instructional practices, and the alignment between coaching and PD was a key strength in implementation.

The school also successfully implemented onboarding and training systems for new staff (Action 5.2), providing a comprehensive summer experience that introduced instructional expectations and foundational teaching practices. Ongoing development for instructional support staff (Action 5.3) ensured that all staff members working directly with students received coaching and professional learning aligned to schoolwide instructional priorities.

Leadership development (Action 5.4) was a notable area of strength this year. Professional development for leaders was intentionally differentiated based on experience and role, with returning Assistant Principals, new Assistant Principals, and Deans each receiving targeted support aligned to their needs. Leaders participated in ongoing coaching development sessions, focused on strengthening skills in coaching, professional development design, and facilitation. These efforts were reinforced through cycles of feedback and practice, and were closely aligned to the school’s coaching model, ensuring consistency and coherence across instructional leadership practices. Opportunities for teacher leadership were also maintained through lead team structures.

Efforts to foster a positive school culture among staff (Action 5.5) were implemented through proactive planning and ongoing responsiveness to staff needs. The school hosted quarterly celebrations, team-building events, and recognition programs, including shout-outs and peer-nominated awards, to build a strong sense of community and appreciation among staff. Regular staff surveys were conducted to gather feedback and inform continuous improvement of adult culture.

Credential and certification support (Action 5.6) was strengthened this year, with the school providing earlier and more proactive communication to teachers regarding their credential status with support from a network credential specialist. Ongoing credential reviews ensured that teachers remained on track for compliance, and staff reported feeling well-supported throughout the process.

Hiring strategies (Action 5.7) and compensation and benefits structures (Action 5.8) were implemented as planned, with the school utilizing network-supported recruitment processes, inclusive hiring practices, and ongoing staff feedback to inform compensation and benefits. These systems supported the recruitment and retention of a diverse and highly qualified staff.

Overall, implementation of Goal 5 actions was strong and cohesive. Key successes included the alignment of coaching and professional development, differentiated leadership training, strengthened credential support systems, and a positive adult culture. These efforts contributed to a supportive and high-functioning staff environment, positioning the school to continue attracting, developing, and retaining high-quality educators.

An explanation of material differences between Budgeted Expenditures and Estimated Actual Expenditures and/or Planned Percentages of Improved Services and Estimated Actual Percentages of Improved Services.

There were no material differences between Budgeted Expenditures and Estimated Actual Expenditures.

A description of the effectiveness or ineffectiveness of the specific actions to date in making progress toward the goal.

The actions implemented under Goal 5 have been effective in maintaining a high-quality, well-supported faculty and staff, as evidenced by strong outcomes in teacher credentialing and staff perception data. The school successfully sustained high levels of fully credentialed teachers (93%), reflecting the effectiveness of hiring strategies, credential monitoring systems, and proactive support provided to staff (Actions 5.6 and 5.7). Early communication around credential status and ongoing support throughout the year ensured that teachers remained on track and felt supported in meeting certification requirements.

In addition, staff perception data from the Spring TNTP survey indicates strong results in the area of Learning Environment, with teachers reporting positive experiences related to school culture, collaboration, and support. These outcomes demonstrate the effectiveness of the school's investment in professional development and coaching systems (Actions 5.1 and 5.4), which provided consistent, actionable feedback and aligned support for instructional improvement. The coherence between coaching cycles, professional development, and leadership support contributed to a strong instructional culture and a sense of shared purpose among staff.

Efforts to foster a positive adult culture (Action 5.5), including recognition systems, team-building events, and regular opportunities for feedback, further supported teacher satisfaction and retention. Additionally, differentiated leadership development and targeted onboarding and support for new and returning staff (Actions 5.2 and 5.4) ensured that all staff members received development aligned to their experience and role.

Overall, the data indicate that Goal 5 actions have been effective in supporting teacher development, maintaining a highly qualified staff, and fostering a positive and collaborative professional environment. These systems position the school to continue retaining strong educators and sustaining high-quality instruction for students.

A description of any changes made to the planned goal, metrics, target outcomes, or actions for the coming year that resulted from reflections on prior practice.

A review of implementation and outcome data from the 2025–26 school year indicates that no significant changes are necessary to the planned goal, metrics, target outcomes, or actions for Goal 5 in the 2026–27 school year. Current data demonstrate that existing systems for hiring, developing, and retaining staff are effective in maintaining a highly qualified workforce and a positive professional culture. As the school enters the final year of the LCAP cycle, the focus will remain on sustaining and refining these practices to ensure continued staff development, retention, and strong instructional outcomes for students.

Building on the success of this year’s robust observation and coaching cycles, the school will continue to prioritize teacher and leadership development with a focused emphasis on the consistent implementation of adopted instructional materials with fidelity. This includes deepening instructional practices related to assessment, learning design, delivery of content, checks for understanding, and the use of effective scaffolds to support all learners. Additionally, there will be an increased focus on classroom management strategies that utilize least invasive redirections to maximize student engagement and maintain a healthy and thriving learning environment.

Leadership development will further prioritize strengthening capacity in data analysis and responsive instructional decision-making, as well as deepening content and curriculum expertise. Leaders will continue to refine their ability to support teachers in implementing high-quality instructional methodologies and using assessment data to drive continuous improvement. These refinements are intended to enhance the effectiveness of existing systems while maintaining alignment with the overall goal.
