





Legislative Hot Topics 13 Introduced ahead of a ruling on the Vergara v. California lawsuit, Assembly Member Susan Bonilla (D-Concord) would tackle some of the laws being challenged through AB 934 Among its numerous provisions, AB 934 would allow a school board to require a certificated employee to continue to be classified as a "probationary" employee for a third or fourth year under certain conditions The bill would also change the order for terminating certificated employees: 1. Probationary employees who received below satisfactory reviews. 2. Permanent employees without satisfactory reviews. 3. Probationary employees with satisfactory reviews. Permanent employees with satisfactory reviews. With the inevitable opposition of the California Teachers Association, this bill has a slim chance for success



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
